

END OF AN ERA - THE OUTBACK BIDS FAREWELL TO THE PLATE FAMILY

The 12th of July 2013 will be remembered as the day the outback collectively shed a tear for the departure of the Plates from Oodnadatta. People travelled from far and wide to give the Plate family collective hugs and kisses of thanks for their pioneering spirit that helped keep a little town on the map for so many years. What Oodnadatta lacked in size it makes up for in spirit and that spirit was on display in all its glory last Friday in Oodna-bloody-datta!

The celebrations began at 3:30pm at the place formerly known as the Oodnadatta Airstrip. Father Paul Bourke was the MC for the event and opened the proceedings. He soon introduced the Hon Gail Gago, Minister for Local Government / State Relations and Regional Development. Minister Gago gave a touching and respectful speech that painted a picture of a man that the State Government had a long and somewhat difficult relationship with. Despite this, her presence was acknowledgement by the State of his value and contribution to his community and the region. Gail spoke of his endless letters to Ministers and government departments demanding better services for the outback. She described a man that had an undeniable impact. She spoke of his love of Oodnadatta, his passion for the outback, his unwavering concern for the safety of travellers and his tireless, voluntary work to ensure the Oodnadatta airstrip was maintained and remained serviced at all times.

It was at some point during Minister Gago's speech that I thought of Adam and, that if he was watching, how droll the situation must have appeared to him. He was no fan of governments. Thomas Paine once famously said that "Government, even in its best state, is but a necessary evil; in its worst state, an intolerable one." This could have easily been Adam's words. He didn't particularly like government or its minions and he certainly wasn't afraid to let them know it! No doubt the irony of the situation would have given him some amusement and resulted in that wry smile of his creeping across his expression.

Lynnie gave a short, impromptu speech that brought a tear to the eye of many in attendance.

Ned Loades, School Principal and current Chairman of the Oodnadatta Progress Association closed off the formalities at the Airport with a frank and honest speech that captured the nature and the character of the man being honoured. He spoke of Adam's involvement and commitment to the community and the controversy that, more often than not, came as part of the package. He spoke of Adam's relentless capacity to work, come rain, hail or insufferable heat. Such a common trait in so many outback pioneers. He was the "can do man", the "go to guy" in the community. If something needed to be done at the school Adam would lend a hand. Something need fixing? Adam will be able to fix it! Don't know where to get that part? Adam will know.

"I reckon that one day Nike came to Oodnadatta and saw Adam at the Pink Roadhouse and that's where they got their slogan 'Just Do It'", said Ned.

Ned is right, if Adam saw something that he thought needed to be done, he just did it.

Ned continued with a description of Adam's broad knowledge on many subjects.

"Adam often amazed me and others with his wide breadth of knowledge and interests including his motor sport, his irrational like of Peugeots, his love of fiats, Porsches, boats, bikes, politics, stock market, local and personal history, trucks, building, tourism and the list goes on and on."

He spoke of Adam's commitment as a father and that he wanted the best for his kids.

"He was a proud father of his four children and he wanted the best school for them and the community. So Adam did what Adam always did best: he worked towards his vision and he set about making the best school possible."

Ned's speech was not all strawberries and cream though. He spoke of Adam's ability to get along so well with children but that he often clashed with adults; especially many of those that ever sat on the Oodnadatta Progress Association with him.

"His passion for our community made it hard for Adam to work within the structure of a committee. This is not unusual for many people who are driven and have great vision. Like the famous saying goes; a Camel is a horse designed by a committee!"

I think if Adam was watching he would have been very proud of Mr Loades. He said some things that would have upset a few people but they were words that needed to be said. Maybe there was a little bit of Adam speaking through Ned that day...

"Adam understood that handing over an asset for one dollar meant losing control of what was owned by the Progress Association and ultimately our community."

The airstrip, that was owned by the Oodnadatta Progress Association, was sold to the State Government for a dollar (yes \$1.00!). Adam fought for years for ownership of the airport to remain in the hands of the Oodnadatta Progress Association but sadly that battle was eventually lost. Ned explained that the sale has resulted in a loss of refuelling capacity and therefore a massive reduction in air traffic. Adam knew this would occur. Whilst it remained in Progress hands, they could avoid much of the rules and regulations that governments shackle themselves and society with. The detrimental impact was immediately felt by the community.

"The reduced numbers of people stopping here as they fly over the country has truly led to a loss of vibrancy for our town and increased the sense of isolation just that little bit more. We used to have a lot of planes landing here and we would laugh to see those tourists using a pink sack truck to take their groceries back to their tent next to their plane," Ned continued.

"The small number of people that made the decision to sell our airstrip, no longer live in this town. They did not have a long term vision for maintaining vibrancy and economic development, and failed to consult meaningfully with the wider community. Adam was frustrated and angered by the narrow thinking that led to such a drastic and irreversible decision, directed in part at Adam himself. Yet it didn't in any way deter his spirit, and he was quickly out there lobbying for the best deal possible for the future."

Millions of tiny yellow wildflowers have burst into bloom in the desert around Coober Pedy over the weekend.

The event follows 37mm of rain in June and a few weeks of warm July weather that peaked at 26C on Friday 12 July. The desert is unusually green at present.

The unusual flora explosion couldn't have happened at a more appropriate time as the outback celebrated the naming of the Oodnadatta Aerodrome for long term resident and visionary Adam Plate who lost his life in August 2012 during a rally car accident.



RESIDENTIAL CARE FOR COOBER PEDY & DISTRICTS AGED RESIDENTS STILL SOUGHT

The provision of an Aged Care Facility offering good, affordable low care residential accommodation is still a priority for the Far North Health Advisory Council.

The Far North Health Advisory Council (FNHAC) comprises of representatives from Country Health SA Local Health Network, Coober Pedy Hospital & Health Services, District Council of Coober Pedy and representation from the local community and surrounding environs.

The FNHAC have put this project at the top of their concerns and priorities for this area.

The following tasks have been conducted to support the need for an aged care facility within Coober Pedy: Surveys have been conducted, case studies collected, ABS census figures looked at (unfortunately due to the low recorded ABS figures for Coober Pedy the low numbers do not demonstrate the real figures and therefore put us at a disadvantage).

The FNHAC are looking towards preparing a submission to put our case to the Federal and State Governments for the building of a suitable, caring environment for our senior citizens to live out their final years here in Coober Pedy.

Other points of community interest from our last meeting were the news that the Coober Pedy Hospital had received a grant of \$100,000 to repair and replace water pipes and plumbing throughout the hospital - this work has commenced.

A motion was also passed that this group would support any attempts to limit the damage to people's health caused by excessive alcohol consumption in Coober Pedy.

The Far North Health Advisory Council meets monthly and is open to suggestions on how our health services can be improved. Local community representatives are: Trish Turner, Edward Radeka, Geoff Piggott, Judy Underwood and Carmelo Crisa.

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

MAYOR'S REPORT 16th July 2013

It was my pleasure to undertake two citizenships in June. Jayne Price and Jerlyn Nathan both long term residents of Coober Pedy became Australian Citizens.

The CEO and I are still attempting to facilitate a meeting with the APY Executive Council. Council's Strategic plan (2.3.2) and Councils Alcohol Management Plan (1.2.2.2) call for Council to formalise a link and establish a relationship with the APY Executive. I understand that the APY Executive is also keen for this to happen.

Council resolved at the meeting dated 21st May 2013 that

Further, that Council support and participate in a community driven conciliatory delegation to visit the APY Lands for the sole purpose of sourcing written support for the above points from the Executive Board of the APY and further, that no other initiatives be raised with the Executive Board during the conciliatory mission until a community consensus is achieved.

Given that the resolution of Council restricts my discussion with the APY Executive to two points of conversation I now seek direction from Council as to the latitude permissible of any future discussions that may eventuate.

It is my opinion to enable me to hold discussions with the APY Executive that deviate from these two topics I would require the original motion to be rescinded. R13(3) of the Local Government Procedures at Meetings Regulations state that

A motion the effect of which, if carried, would be to revoke or amend a resolution passed since the last periodic election requires written notice of motion.

COOBER PEDY SENIOR OFFICERS' GROUP Minutes Meeting 7th June 2013

1 STRATEGIC PLAN

The draft SOG Strategic Plan was presented to the meeting for discussion & endorsement.

It was resolved to adopt the SOG Strategic Plan 2013/14 with the changes discussed.

2 ALCOHOL MANAGEMENT REVIEW

Karyn Reid review consultant presented to the meeting and gave an update on the review of the Coober Pedy Alcohol Management Plan. Representatives of the SOG Alcohol Management Plan Working Party also have met with Karen on the 9th May & 6th June 2013.

SOG also to write a letter of support to FaHCSIA seeking assistance in having suitable resources available to facilitate the many actions contained within the draft management plan.

3. TRANSITIONAL ACCOMODATION CENTRE

Housing SA stated that the work occurring at the Northern end of Hutchison Street had no connection with the TAC project.

If Council wishes that I comply with the relevant sections of Councils Strategic Plan and Alcohol Management Plan a rescission motion on notice will be required prior to any meeting being scheduled.

On Friday the 12th of July the CEO and I met with minister Piccolo to discuss his reply to Councils request to undertake a Social, Economic and Cultural impact study for the Transitional Accommodation Centre.

We reinforced Councils position on the TAC being that Council will publicly oppose the TAC until such time as the study is undertaken.

We also made it clear that the SOG, Council nor the community has been consulted on a TAC and the community are expecting consultation on a proposed model and location.

We extended an invitation to the Minister to visit Coober Pedy and meet with Council to discuss some of the concerns that Council have in relation to the TAC.

We also provided the Minister with a Copy of the letter Council received from the CPRB&TA expressing their opposition to the TAC.

The Minister has accepted our invitation and will be traveling to Coober Pedy next month to meet with Council.

The Minister has requested from Council a specific list of concerns that Council would like addressed in a Social, Economic and Cultural impact study as a matter of urgency. The Minister intends to discuss these concerns with Council when he visits next month.

Before I left Coober Pedy I heard rumours within the Community that Housing SA was purchasing land to add to their housing stock, presumably to house people as they leave the TAC.

We put this to the Minister who advised that this there was no substance to this claim and that Housing SA were currently selling housing stock across the state in an attempt to meet budgetary constraints.

Council Meeting Happenings

Authorising Officers to issue Burning Certificates

Council has requested that the Chief Officer of the Country Fire Service authorise four Council officers pursuant to Section 81 of the Fire and Emergency Services Act to issue burning permits in Coober Pedy.

Breakaways Co-Management Agreement

Council is a partner in the Breakaways Co-Management Agreement and has many responsibilities under the funding agreement including the employment of an Executive Officer to provide high level leadership, governance and support to the Breakaways Board. This position has been advertised and once finalised will occupy the former RDAFN office space within the Coober Pedy Multicultural Forum.

Opal Mining Heritage Park

Council has resolved to establish a heritage park for the preservation, display and storage of vintage opal mining equipment in Coober Pedy at the old town hall site as part of the 2013/14 budget process. Council has also resolved to apply for funding from the Regional Development Australia Fund – round 5 to help progress stage one of the project.

Regional Express Partnership Agreement

Council's current partnership agreement with REX airlines expired on the 30th June 2013. Council has resolved to enter into a new partnership agreement with REX for a further 3 year period.

Purchase of Garbage Truck

Council has accepted a tender from North East Isuzu to purchase a new Isuzu garbage truck fitted with a 18m³ MacDonald Compactor. The truck should arrive within the next month or so.

Coober Pedy Area School – Week of Science

Council has resolved to add some financial support to a 'Week of Science' to be held at the Coober Pedy Area School from 29th July to 2nd August 2013. Sciworld will come to Coober Pedy with interactive science workshops including astronomy, robotics, electric circuits, rockets, etc for the school students. There will also be a community science event.

Council Annual Business Plan

Council 2013/14 Annual Business Plan has been out for public consultation until the 19th July 2013. Council will consider any submissions received and then adopt the plan etc.

Proposal for Coober Pedy Liquor Licence Conditions

Council has received correspondence from Paul White the Liquor and Gambling Commissioner in regards to concerns about alcohol related misuse in Coober Pedy. Council was consulted and asked to comment on some 15 draft proposed conditions to be placed on the take-away outlets as a means to prevent and reduce the incidence of alcohol related misuse. The consultation is yet to be completed with advice of the final conditions etc.



Coober Pedy Street and Road Names

Where did the name of your street come from?

GOLDSWORTHY STREET is most likely named for aviator, inventor, entrepreneur Warwick Goldsworthy and his brother Ross. Warwick and Ross built the first tunnelling machine. Warwick was a pilot. In 1962, he flew a weekly freight service to Coober Pedy for Silver City Air Taxis bringing in perishables like milk, meat, ice and fish. He also flew planes for the Royal Flying Doctor Service, often with no doctor or nurse aboard.

Then, in 1963, with the backing of Beppi Coro, Greg Sherman and Laurie Lehman, Warwick started Opal Air with a 5-passenger, single engine Cessna 205. Opal Air became the first official commuter airline in Australia. Its fleet expanded to include six Cessna 421s, a 9-passenger Merlin and then a 16-passenger, and a 2-pilot Metro. Opal Air flew for 23 accident-free years, connecting Coober Pedy to Adelaide, Roxby Downs and Ayers Rock.

Warwick Goldsworthy was an enthusiastic opal miner. His early education included an engineering apprenticeship at Freight Trailers and years of work as a fitter and turner. He used his experience to design and make some of Coober Pedy's first tunnelling machines. He designed the first 'round' tunnelling machine. In 1968, he married Gillian and in 1970 he tunnelled a beautiful new dugout for her and his children Melissa and Nigel. Warwick also invented a drill/ blower combination. He experimented with a low pressure reverse circulation system in which the shaft was sealed and pressure used to bring mullock to the surface.

Ross was one of the first projectionists at the new Drive-in which started in 1965. They showed 2 movies a night, 5 nights a week. The second movie was usually a Western. Thursday night was Greek night when they showed foreign, mainly Greek, films.

Ross and Warwick used to build roads. They built the road to the airport. According to Elaine Goldsworthy, Warwick had a run-in with Mrs Brewster over the dust his planes raised when he taxied down the main street in front of her store. That's why he and Ross built the airport so far from the centre of town. Ross also helped build the pipe lines that took salt water to the solar desalination plant and delivered it to businesses in town. He was a refrigeration mechanic. In 1982, he came back with his new wife to sell up and leave but the fires at Coro's and Lucas's gave him reason to stay on and to help rebuild the stores.

Ross likes to take some credit for the sealing of the Stuart Highway. Coober Pedy residents had been complaining for years about the state of the 'highway.' In 1979, it rained for 15 days and no one could travel. Tourists were stranded. It happened that a bus with several politicians on board got bogged. They only had water and a few biscuits on board. Ross was asked to take the Blitz down and pull them out. He took his time about doing it. Apparently the funds were suddenly available after that.

In 2010, Warwick was working on an electric car and held patents for a condenser and water cooler. He was inventing and innovating new technologies up until his death on Christmas Day of that year.

Ross and Elaine live in Queensland.

Warwick is survived by wife Gillian, son Nigel, daughter Melissa and 4 grandchildren.

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END OF AN ERA - OUTBACK BIDS FAREWELL TO PLATE FAMILY

Ned's speech was followed by a heartfelt tribute by one of Adam's best mates, Trevor Wright of Wrightsair fame. Trevor is the unofficial Mayor of William Creek and another great visionary in the outback.

Trevor and his pilots did a "missing man formation" flyover, an aerial salute performed at funerals and memorials typically in memory of a fallen pilot. It was a show of great respect by Trevor to his fallen comrade. Trevor - you did your mate proud.

Adam's mother Jocelyn, Lynnie and his daughters Alice, Tilly and Ruby, were close at hand as Minister Gago cut the ribbon officially naming the facility the "Adam Plate Aerodrome". This was followed by a blessing of the aerodrome performed by Fr Paul.

It is fitting that the Airport that Adam loved so much and fought for so hard for so long will now forever bear his name. Even in his passing his fighting spirit lives on in those people he touched and I see this as possibly Adam's final victory.

In the words of the great Ghandi and quoted by Mr Loades during his speech:

"First they ignore you, then they laugh at you, then they fight you, then you win."

The party soon migrated over to the Pink Roadhouse where the Plates treated all of their friends and family to a free barbecue, outback hospitality at its finest.

The barbecue was followed by a number of speeches. The Plates bidding the outback farewell and those that love them and will miss them recounted entertaining anecdotes of Adam, Lynnie, Jack Alice, Tilly and Ruby's time in Oodnadatta.

The evening's ceremonies began with an introduction by the MC, Alice Plate, to long-time friend and companion to the Plate family, Audrey Wonga, who performed a Welcome to Country. Alice then invited her mum to the stage.

Lynnie started her speech by thanking everyone for coming but paid special tribute to Adam's 92 year old mother, Jocelyn Plate, who had travelled from Sydney to be there.

"I have no doubt Adam inherited some of his tenaciousness from his mother," said Lynnie.

Lynnie then gave a detailed recount of Adam (a surfer rebel from Sydney) and her (a city girl hippie from Canberra) adventure from Alice Springs to Oodnadatta in 1975 with 6 camels, 6 horses and 50 donkeys. She went on to quote Adam on their arrival in Oodnadatta.

"We were seduced by the exotic nature of hard conditions, the broad landscape and community feel of Oodnadatta, said Adam..." But Lynnie remembered it a little differently. "Hmmm, well I was seduced by Adam and happy to give this new rough and tumble town a go," she said.

"Oodnadatta had a certain charm. We were hippies, looking for the meaning of life, and there was a real appeal about the place where you could do anything, be anyone, and no-one seemed to care."

Lynnie described the many locals that the famous Pink Roadhouse employed over the years. The Plates were also pioneers in employment initiatives being the first in the region to import foreigners for employment in the tourism and hospitality industry. They also started the original Mail Run Tour now owned by Peter Rowe.

She went on to pay tribute to her current "rock" at the Pink Roadhouse and manager for the past 6 years, Hayley Nunn.

Lynnie's focus was people and service at the roadhouse whilst Adam's was the workshop and advocating for better infrastructure and services whilst at the same time fighting back the tendrils of bureaucracy that groped into the outback like a kraken blindly searching for prey.

An amusing and typical anecdote was when, in early 2000, Adam and Lynnie landed in the Environment Court in Adelaide because Adam had graded some roads out the back of Oodnadatta in the Neales River floodplain without permission. After many trips to Adelaide to attend court, Adam was asked to do some rehabilitation work as punishment for his initiative. A week later a big flood did all the rehab for them.

Lynnie spoke of raising a family in Oodnadatta in the 80s. The freedom and safety of growing up in Oodnadatta coupled with boarding school at Pembroke College in Adelaide resulted in the "the best of both worlds for their education".

Lynnie went on to share some personal and amusing letters with the gathering.

In 1992 Alice wrote:

"Dear Mum, Dad and family

"It has been very strict at dinner lately. And tomorrow we have to go to church!! Which I hate because it is too boring.

"My piano teacher is really nice. I had a softball practice for the first time. It was good but I couldn't believe how weak they are at sport. Oodnadatta kids would beat them by far!"

In 1994 Tilly aged 10 wrote:

"Dear Alice

"Look, I really know I said I hate you, but I already miss you even though you have only been gone one day."

The happy times were shared but also the truly devastating times...

"But it was when our son Jack died in 1999 in a road accident at the age of 20 the Oodnadatta community wrapped around our family and helped us struggle through the almost unbearable pain. They watched over us and fed us and allowed us to grieve."

Lynnie went on to explain that the past year, since Adam's passing, has been the most difficult year of her life. She has managed to keep moving forward with the unwavering support of her twin sister Annie as well as her many friends and family and the entire Oodnadatta community.

Lynnie closed her speech with the following words:

"I can tell you that I know I am going to miss Oodnadatta far more than you will ever imagine. I love being part of the Oodnadatta community and I know my family feel the same, so thank you!"

Alice, Tilly and Ruby then gave a joint speech paying tribute to their mum and dad and described the values that they instilled within them as well as imparting many amusing experiences of life growing up in Oodnadatta.

Tony Williams (Mount Barry Station and President of the Oodnadatta Bronco Branding committee) and Eddie Nunn (Macumba Station and President of the Oodnadatta Race Club committee) and Roseanne Woodford all gave speeches that included amusing tales of the Plates time in Oodnadatta.

The formalities ended, the music was cranked up and the bar flowed freely. A good night was had by all.

I managed to snag a little of Lynnie's time at one point in the evening to ask her what she was going to do without the roadhouse. I half expected to hear a hint of regret in her voice and trepidation of imminent change... but I should have known better. That flame for adventure and the great unknown that burns deep in the souls of all pioneers never stops smouldering and I have little doubt that the change will stoke those flames and Lynnie's spirit will be all the more richer for it.

As the wee hours of the morning kicked in I found myself once again, possibly for the final time, at the Plate's dining room table, enjoying their hospitality, surrounded by good company, with a glass of neat scotch in my hand, just as it would have been if Adam was there. I pondered the situation for a moment and thought to myself, "This is what life is all about..." It wasn't a Dewars Adam, but hey, nothing is perfect!

With every ending comes a new beginning. Neville and Adriana Jacobs, former publicans at William Creek and Penong, the outback welcomes you back and we look forward to seeing you at the Pink Roadhouse in September!

Despite the fact that change is an inevitable part of life, I can't help but think, someday in September, the sun will rise and slowly creep across the majestic gibber plains and bathe the Davenport Range in its warm glow as it has done for millennia, but the entire outback will be a little less magic without the Plates in Oodnadatta.

The late Adam Plate, co-owner of the famous Pink Roadhouse at Oodnadatta, was honoured Friday, 12 July, 2013 with Minister for State/Local Government Relations and Regional Development Gail Gago dedicating the Oodnadatta aerodrome in his memory.

The aerodrome is an important transit stop for private and commercial light aircraft flights, and is a centre for scenic flights over Lake Eyre and surrounding areas.

It is also used by the Royal Flying Doctor Service for medical clinics and patient transfers as well as medical emergency evacuations, with about 50 stops at the airstrip each year.

In Oodnadatta for the naming ceremony, Ms Gago said that this commemoration suitably reflects Mr Plate's untrammelled, adventurous spirit.

"For travellers and residents alike, Adam Plate's name was synonymous with the Outback. His passion and vision for the Outback were extraordinary," Ms Gago said.

"Adam and his wife Lynnie were famously 'just passing through' with camels and donkeys in 1975 and never left. Over the next 40 years they became advocates for tourism development and the improvement of services and amenities for the Far North.

"The service they have provided at the Pink Roadhouse since the mid-eighties has held the Far North of South Australia together—providing travellers with a warm welcome, generous assistance, vital supplies, and expert local advice.

"Adam lobbied to name the road from Marla to Marree the Oodnadatta Track, and established life-saving UHF radio communication networks for travellers and pastoralists.

"For more than 20 years Adam also maintained and managed the aerodrome, helping to ensure it remained open and provided access for emergency services, locals and visitors.

"I am honoured to dedicate the aerodrome in his memory."

The aerodrome was significantly refurbished in 2012 under the Australian Government's Remote Aerodrome Safety Program, with the project jointly funded by the Federal Department of Infrastructure and Transport and the South Australian Department of Planning, Transport and Infrastructure.

The upgrade now provides emergency response aircraft with reliable 24 hour access, improving safety and response times for emergency services and the travelling public in the event of a critical incident.

The aerodrome is owned by the Outback Communities Authority and managed with the assistance of the Oodnadatta Community.

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Royalties for Regions a 'must' for SA

A \$1bn Regional development fund to boost rural communities is essential if regional SA is to avoid further decline.

"It's all one-way traffic", said Family First spokesperson Bob Day. "The money moves one way. Rural SA earns it, the city spends it – on itself. Country people have no voice in the city."

The State Government is coming under increasing pressure over its decisions to spend up big on

city-based projects like upgrading Victoria Square, new city trams, a new hospital, a new desalination plant, a new Adelaide oval and a new footbridge over the River Torrens so football goers can take a short-cut to the casino.

"Then there's all the money spent on city-based marginal seats - like sound-proofing buildings under the Adelaide airport flight path and new sporting facilities.

"All this money gets spent and who

misses out? Rural communities. They have bad roads, deteriorating health services and poor mobile phone coverage.

"Take the classic example of the need for a de-salination plant in Orroroo. The water in Orroroo is 300% more saline than Adelaide water. It damages everything it touches - appliances, whitegoods, pumps, you name it. If Orroroo was in a marginal seat do you think this situation would continue? Not for a minute."



Petrol taxes for roads!

Whether it's taking kids to school or taking farm produce to market, good roads are essential. The deterioration of SA's roads over the past two decades especially in our country areas has been disgraceful – especially considering the amount of money collected in petrol taxes. "Petrol taxes were introduced to pay for roads - building new ones and maintaining existing ones" said Family First spokesman Bob Day. "My first job was with the Highways Department. In those days petrol taxes were spent

on roads – building new ones and maintaining existing ones, he said.

"It is a classic government ploy – they introduce a new tax or levy, earmark it for a specific purpose, and then slowly siphon the money off into other things. After a few years they break all connection between the tax and the specific purpose. It's no wonder people get cynical about politics. "In 2011 motorists paid nearly \$20bn in fuel taxes (including GST on fuel). Barely half of that was spent on roads."



Furore over govt's \$100,000 splurge on dinner and coffee machines

The Federal Government is in damage control following revelations it spent \$21,000 on a single dinner and more than \$90,000 on top-of-the-range coffee machines for its staff.

A Senate Estimates Committee has heard how the Department of Agriculture, Fisheries & Forestry spent \$21,000 for one dinner at one hotel whilst the Department of Industry and the Department of the Clean Energy Regulator spent over \$90,000 on coffee machines installed in each of its staff kitchens.

"They find the money for lavish dinners and skinny lattes but turn a blind eye to those doing it tough", said Family First spokesman Bob Day. "They've got their priorities all wrong".

Vandalism of Stephanie Alexander Kitchen Garden



RIGHT: pot plants tipped over and plants pulled out of their pots. Garden beds damaged and trampled.

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


