
Jayde took the opportunity when the Citizen Award nominations were called for to tender a nomination for Dawn.

In accepting the Citizen of the Year award, Dawn said, "I'm simply overwhelmed and very humbled, that what I consider to be ordinary, is worthy of this award."



Coober Pedy's Dawn Jones A modern day St. Francis

On Australia Day the Mayor of Coober Pedy, Steve Baines announced that the 2012 Coober Pedy Citizen of the year was Dawn Jones.

"Most would know Dawn for her untiring work with animals. She is normally the first person people call when their pets are injured or sick and is forever adopting and looking after any animal in need", said Mayor Baines.

As an individual in her own right and in conjunction with Chris Butler, Dawn has ensured that the Opal Festival parade has floats each year.

Gathering materials for potential floats is a daily consideration for Dawn as she goes about her chores. Pre-Opal Festival sees both Dawn and Chris assisting organisations to build their floats.

Without this commitment and expertise, the parade floats simply might not happen. Each year requires fresh inspiration, energy and materials.

Dawn Jones, mother of 6 children and registered foster carer is the type of person who makes you wish you were a lizard, a bird or even a local dog.

According to family and friends Dawn is a modern Day St. Francis, whom many of us will know is the Patron Saint of animals and the environment.

There are many stories about the 12th Century St. Francis preaching to the birds, befriending a rabbit and fish, and taming a wolf and there are just as many stories about Dawn Jones who for many a pregnant canine mother has stayed up all night to make sure their litter of pups has whelped safely.

If a wounded bird is found in the school grounds, Dawn is called on to work her magic.

Dawn is also well known for her years running the Coober Pedy Wildlife Park where she worked

tirelessly on a daily basis providing a sanctuary for orphaned members of the environment and rehabilitating the wounded.

Horror struck when domestic dogs went on a rampage one night and tore down shelters and buildings killing most of the wildlife. A shattered Dawn Jones closed down the sanctuary, but didn't retire from her animal charity work.

Dawn continues to rehabilitate injured native fauna back into the wild and find homes for orphaned animals within the community.

Often lizards, dragons and other fauna are brought to Dawn that have been injured on the roads. Dawn has developed a program to rehabilitate and release them back into the wild.

This year's Citizen Award recipient was recognised for their hours of volunteer work within the community over a long period of time.

Dawn Jones' 6 children all maintain close ties with Coober Pedy.


Over a long period of time Dawn has worked with most of the organisations in Coober Pedy as a volunteer or in a supportive role.

Cash strapped archive struggles to Coober Dedy REGIONAL TIMES preserve indigenous history **Government of South Australia**

Australia's flagship institute for indigenous With magnetic tape recordings becoming studies has stopped giving out research grants as it diverts funding to save a century of cultural recordings from oblivion.

The Australian Institute of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Studies (AIATSIS) has a worldrenowned archive of about a million items, much of which - old tape recordings of languages and songs; film and photographs – it is struggling to digitise before the material disintegrates.

A 12-year Commonwealth funding program allocating \$3.2 million per year for the digital conversion of the archive ended in 2011 and was not renewed, leaving 80 per cent of the collection unconverted and prompting AIATSIS to halt its grant program, which had has been running for more than 20 years with a strong emphasis on collaborative fieldwork in indigenous communities.

As it scrambles to preserve the recorded history of indigenous Australia, the institute has also curtailed other activities, such as its outreach program of taking copies of historical and cultural material back to the communities where they were gathered up to a century ago.

It was a "massive shame" to cut back on the historical outreach program which gave people the chance to see images of their ancestors and hear their people's lost songs and languages, but preserving as much as possible of the endangered archive must be the priority, said John Janke, executive and communications director at AIATSIS.

"It's material that's been collected over past 50 years by researchers: over 700,000 photographs, 10,000 video titles, motion picture, sound recordings, manuscripts, collected works of people, everything," Mr Janke said.

inaudible, film rotting from vinegar syndrome, and glass-negative photographs up to 100 years old decaying, "we don't know how much has been lost already," Mr Janke said.

"We have the world's most significant archive of indigenous recordings and research, but the dilemma for us is that we have such a backlog of material that the audio tape that we don't get to, or the film in the canister, could be the one that contains the song or language or image that is priceless."

"Some of those mediums could contain songs or traditions or langauge that are no longer spoken so we hope to get that before it's lost forever. In the current crisis we are digitising those items that are at significant risk first, but at the same time we stop digitising ones which might then deteriorate.'

Jon Altman, a Research Professor in Anthropology at the Australian National University who is both an institute member and donor of research material to the archive, said that the archive held a "very, very important collection" full of unrecognised treasures, and the timing of the crisis was ironic.

"It's interesting that we've got this report from the expert panel on the recognition of indigenous people in the constitution, talking about language and culture and all the rest of it from the past, but what's there from the past and the present is under-resourced in [terms of] being properly digitised and properly looked after," he said.

The institute was "extraordinarily highly regarded" by anthropologists and indigenous researchers around the world, and "they would be shocked" to hear that the archive is endangered and study grants stopped, Professor Altman said.

"We have funded it for a year out of our appropriation, but we would like it to be funded as part of our appropriation.'

Philanthropy has not been forthcoming, Mr Janke said.

17 year old local girl Stacey Mibus is a home at 2.30 or 3am. I still attended fire fighter of 3 1/2 years experience, after joining the Coober Pedy CFS at the age of 14.

Stacey is a born and bred Coober Pedy girl and will complete her year 12 schooling at Coober Pedy Area School this year.

The discipline of the CFS has given Stacey direction, enough so that she plans to have an initial career in Child Care and then aim for the Police Force.

CPRT: Why did you decide to join the CFS, particularly at the age of 14? STACEY: One of my friends was a member of the CFS and has since moved on. She suggested to me that I should look into joining up as she felt it would be a good experience for me in helping out the community. She recommended me and so I did the paperwork and sent it off. I received confirmation back to say I was cleared to join. First I became a cadet, which was available back then, and after a few more cadets joined we decided to do Basic Firefighter Stage 1 Course. This course was run over a weekend and everything fell into place after that.

CPRT: How did your parents feel about you joining the CFS?

STACEY: Mum and Dad were really proud of me for making this choice. They both encouraged me. Whatever time I get called out, either mum or dad take me to the fire station.

CPRT: What is the hardest job you've ever attended?

STACEY: My first bushfire was probably the hardest as being that close to a fire and feeling the intense heat was so real and initially overwhelming.

CPRT: How did you overcome those initial feelings? STACEY: Being part of a team was very reassuring. On the way to the fire we did a fire plan and discussed our roles. The others already had experience so I was buffered a bit. Nobody is asked to do anything which is unreasonable or they aren't trained for.

CPRT: Summer is traditionally the busiest time and with volunteer numbers down this year, how busy has it been for the firies?

STACEY: We had eight fires in six days, from 11th - 16th January. The grass fire we attended on the 16th January on the Oodnadatta Road near Coober Pedy was pretty exhausting.

After school I was booked to baby sit the following night but after lightning started another fire out on the pastoral lands went straight to Glendambo to help fight this fire, arrived home late and then got up and went to school again. This is fairly typical during the fireban season.

CPRT: As well as fighting fires, what other responsibilities do you have within the CFS?

STACEY: This year I've taken on some of the administration, which spreads the work out amongst the team more evenly. Along with other crew members I also help wash and clean out the trucks and keep the station tidy.

CPRT: Do you manage to go out socially?

STACEY: Of course! I have a normal life, just like everyone else. In fact I probably have more than others because CFS is another form of socialising. We have a great crew who are east to get along with and we always manage to have some fun despite we are doing a serious job. We also get to meet a lot of people in our travels that we otherwise might never come across.

CPRT: What else are you involved in? STACEY: In my own time I baby sit for people in town which enables them to work.

For the last two years I have been doing a School Based Traineeship with Mini Gems Childcare Centre and work there one day per week and attend school 4 days. I am also a volunteer for the Saints Football Club as a boundary umpire and water girl. I attend the trips where the Saints play away as well as the home games.

CPRT: What about school work? STACEY: I do have to keep up to date with school work so I do everything else around it.

CPRT: Do you think that by becoming a firefighter at a young age it has influenced your career choices for the future?

STACEY: Yes I do. After having the discipline of the CFS I feel strongly drawn towards the Police Force as an ultimate career choice.

Ants can also be directed away from the home by placing mixture inside a small jar with holes in the lid and positioned where only the ants will find it.

New Wage Connect subsidy puts over 500 unemployed Australians back in work

516 long term unemployed Australians have found a paying job this month, with the help of the Australian Government's new Wage Connect Subsidy.

35 000 new wage subsidies are being made available over the next four years to encourage employers to take on job seekers who have been unemployed for more than two years.

Minister for Employment Participation Kate Ellis said, "The Wage Connect Subsidy is about giving employers the incentive to give an unemployed Australian a chance, when they might not otherwise have been given one.


Wage Connect helps employers to offset their initial training and labour costs and remove barriers that may have stopped them taking on staff in the past.

Eligible employers will receive around \$5 700 for each job placement, or around \$220 each week (pre GST) to offset the costs of wages and training for new employees for the first six months they are in the job.

"We know that people who have been unemployed for a long period of time have difficulty finding full time employment because they often don't have the necessary skills and work experience employers are looking for."

"Our Government is committed to ensuring that through initiatives like Wage Connect, the benefits of paid work are extended to more Australians, particularly disadvantaged job seekers."

The Australian Government will invest almost \$95 million over the next four years in the Wage Connect subsidy

PROPOSED CHANGES TO PLUMBERS FEDERAL MINING OHS&W **REGULATIONS DEFERRED**

to be implemented on the first of January 2012 have been deferred for twelve months, while lawmakers, Safe Work Australia and Safe Work SA to consider the implications/changes to any OHS&W regulations that affect miners.

Regional Development Australia Far North (RDAFN) and Field Officers of the Mining and Quarrying OHS Committee (MAQOHSC), met with the South Australian Opal Alliance in Coober Pedy in August to discuss the proposed Regulations, and how they would affect their current operations. The meeting also discussed which of the new regulations they could implement without much impact to their current structures. The new mining regulations would have impacted on small miners, such as quarrying, opal and sapphire mining, which are often run by owner/ operators of one to two people.

RDAFN, with assistance from the MAQOHSC Field Officers drafted a national submission to Safe Work Australia, on behalf of the National Opal Miners Association, addressing the points of concern for the industry as a whole and the potential impact on the sector across Australia. The submission was ranked number four nationally out of eighty nine submissions to Safe Work Australia and consequently the federal

Proposed changes to federal mining occupational and state organisations will be taking an extra twelve months health safety and welfare (OHS&W) regulations to consider the best way forward for smaller miners.

> Claire Wiseman, Acting CEO of RDAFAN said that the outcome was a great result for small miners in the Far North of the state, "Often opal miners are owner/operators, working alone or with a few family members to mine this precious stone that is Australia's iconic national gem.'

> 'The substantial changes that were being proposed could have threatened the viability of the entire industry, so it is great to see that Safe Work Australia have considered the points of our submission and are taking the time to consider what's the best solution for this niche mining sector".

> "Nationally opal mining is worth in excess of \$85 million per annum and Australia is responsible for approximately 95% of the world's opal production. Although opal mining is a niche market for the country, the opal represents everything that is unique about outback Australia, with even its formation still a bit of a mystery. This was recognised by the Federal Government in 1993 when the opal was declared Australia's national gem stone," Ms Wiseman said.

> "The safe extraction of opal is important to the Far North region and we are pleased that Safe Work Australia is considering our submission on behalf of all opal miners more closely. We hope for a positive outcome for all parties involved in niche mining," Ms Wiseman went on to say.

An opportunity for the Coober Pedy community to help those at risk of suicide







RESEARCH: TEA TREE OIL EFFECTIVE AGAINST FLY STRIKE AND LICE INFESTATIONS

The war against fly strike and lice percent kill rate of first stage maggots. The infestations in sheep has taken a positive turn with new research showing that tea tree oil is very effective in treating both of the afflictions.

The research, coordinated by the Rural Industries Research and Development Corporation (RIRDC), found that tea tree oil was highly successful in both preventing lice infestations and killing blowfly maggot larvae.

Dr Peter James from the Queensland Alliance for Agriculture and Food Innovation (QAAFI), who was the study's lead researcher, said "Our lab trials showed that a 1 percent tea tree oil formulation reliably produced a 100 percent kill rate of lice and lice eggs, but we were very pleased to see that our pen trials generated the same results," Dr James said.

research also demonstrated that tea tree oil had a strong repellent effect against adult flies, which prevented eggs being laid on the wool for up to six weeks.

"Tea-tree oil could be effective as a preventative treatment for wounds caused by mulesing, tail docking or any wound likely to be struck. It has also been shown to have antibacterial properties and is suggested to have wound healing effects," Dr James said.

"The use of many natural products on a commercial scale has often been hampered by its variable quality but tea tree oil is very well placed in this regard as its composition is specified under an international standard,

We carefully inspected the two week shorn sheep at two, six, 12 and 20 weeks after being dipped in the 1 percent tea tree oil formulation and at all points no lice were found in the wool.

"We also tested sheep with longer wool and the results showed that by jetting both and 2 percent tea tree oil formulations louse numbers reduced by 94 percent in comparison to controls at two weeks after treatment."

The laboratory-based fly strike research used formulations consisting of 1 percent tea tree oil which reliably led to a 100

ISO 4730. This ensures the supply of a consistent product, which is essential when using a product as an insecticide.

"Getting the formulation exactly right is vital and it's something that will require more research. Its not as simple as mixing tea tree oil with water and applying it to your sheep; its a complex and exact science. More research needs to be conducted before we can definitively say that tea tree oil is a viable treatment for fly strike and lice infestations however these initial findings are very encouraging.'

The research findings are available in the RIRDC publication 'Controlling fly strike and louse infections in sheep with tea tree oil' which can be downloaded for free from www.rirdc.gov.au.

WPG Resources returns to the iron ore industry in South Australia at Giffen Well

WPG Resources Ltd withdrew from the iron ore sector when it sold its iron ore assets to OneSteel in October 2011 for approximately \$320 million.

The Company is pleased to advise that it has now reentered the iron ore business in South Australia with the signing of binding Heads of Agreement with Brisbane based Maosen Australia Pty Ltd covering EL 3945 at Giffen Well.

Giffen Well was originally part of the South Australian Steel and Energy Project (SASE) but had been relinquished by the time WPG acquired the Peculiar Knob and Hawks Nest tenements from SASE in 2006. Its location is shown in the attached ASX announcement.

Child Care providers can apply to deliver more occasional and in home child care places

Minister for Early Childhood and Child Care Kate Ellis announced to child care providers how they can apply to deliver an additional 1500 In Home and Occasional Care places, funded by the Australian Government.
