Charles Darwin University education lecturer Dr Al Strangeways has won the 2010 Portrait of a Senior Territorian award for her oil painting of Alice Springs grandmother Mona Hunter, announced at a reception at Parliament House in October.

"Al Strangeways winning work, titled Mona, is the result of a photograph taken at the Coober Pedy Races earlier this year and given to Ms Strangeways", said Coober Pedy's David Hunter, Mona's son.

Mona was born in 1931 in Mintabie to a Luritja mother (Linda Brown) and an Irish father (Larry O'Toole) "Larry was a wild Irishman", laughed grandson David.

Larry O'Toole was a well-sinker working in the Far North of the state. In 1920 Larry was attributed with finding the first opal at Mintabie in his work sinking wells in the district. It was up north where Larry met Linda Brown who was living in the Fregon Aboriginal community.

Mona and her siblings including Henry grew up around various stations such as Wintinna Station and also Welbourne Hill where Mona had taken on domestic work from around eight years of age.

David says that at one time when light skinned children were being taken away to missions, Mrs. Phyl Giles whom Mona worked for at that time, fostered Mona to protect her from being taken to a mission with many others who later became known as the stolen generation.

Mona was able to teach herself to read and write on the station as well as occupy herself with painting. It was at Welbourne Hill where she realised her passion for horses which would continue on throughout her life. Welbourne Hill remained home to Mona until she met and married Johnny Hunter.

Johnny worked with a camel train carrying supplies between busy, remote communities such as Oodnadatta and Marla.

In 1957 the Hunter family moved to the 'big smoke' in Oodnadatta in order to educate the children. At that time Oodnadatta was a hub of the outback being an important Ghan rail head on the stock route which ran between Alice Springs and Marree.

In Oodnadatta Johnny Hunter worked at the Airport which was an army fuelling point. He refuelled up to 50 army aircraft per day while Mona busied herself looking after home and family. Between them they raised 10 children who have, to date, produced 23 grandchildren and 7 great-grandchildren.

It was the Hunters presence in Oodnadatta that revitalised the Oodnadatta Races. With Mona's love for horses she had become a very good track rider and David recalls seeing his mum being hurtled off Dick Nunn's horse "Bay Walk" at around 30 years of age.

The 10 Hunter children, all a product of their Oodnadatta education are Maxine, now living in Mt. Gambier, Darryl at Charters Towers, Elizabeth in Melbourne, Connie at Broken Hill, David lives in Coober Pedy, Bobby is at Dulkanina, Carol at Alice Springs owns and trains racehorses, Timothy is at Alice Springs, Heather at Ringwood near Alice Springs and Richard is at Ingomar Station.

Subsequently after Oodnadatta the family spent much of their lives living and working on station properties throughout South and Central Australia.

Anna Creek Station and Stuart Creek Station were home to the Hunters for nearly 20 years.

At Anna Creek Station, Mona looked after Dick Nunn's family while the Hunter children grew up on the biggest cattle station in the world.

Dick's daughter Rachel recalls with great fondness. her life growing up with the Hunters on Anna Creek Station

"I have been great friends with Auntie Mona all my life', said Rachel. I always loved to sit and chat as her knowledge of the outback is incredible. She also has one of the happiest laughs", said Rachel.

PORTRAIT OF MONA HUNTER BRINGS BACK MEMORIES FOR OUTBACK FAMILY

David Hunter who lives locally and works at Prominent Hill has raised his own childen on station life and remote living. David is now content to play grandpa to his own three grandchildren living in Coober Pedy. One could say he has been blessed having grown up in a large family in the Australian Outback, with an added touch of the Blarney stone.

Artist Al Strangeways summed up her choice of subject saying, "Mona is an impressive woman of great character, who has, in her own words, had 'a good life: a hard life, but a good life', and I wanted to try to express this."

Dr Strangeways took around three months to complete the painting for the Northern Territory project which is designed to help tell the story of many Territorians, both young and old.

"Auntie Mona really spoilt us Anna Creek. She was a great cook. It did'nt matter how many she cooked for, you could always get a meal", recalls Rachel of her childhood.

"There is a wonderful painting hanging on my wall that Auntie Mona painted at Senior Citizens and gave to me as a gift".

"She loves the telephone and when she rings it's a couple of hours before she hangs up as she likes nothing more than knowing what is happening in your life".

"You hear what's going on in the lives of her family and she keeps us up to date with all the grand-childrens progress. She is so proud of her family. We must also let her know if there is rain and how the country is looking".

"It's so pleasing for all of us that Auntie Mona has been rewarded with such a magnificent portrait", Rachel said.

In their semi-retirement Johnny and Mona Hunter took the family to settle at Lake Everard near Kingoonya and remained there until Johnny passed away in 1992.

After the death of her husband Mona moved to Alice Springs where she has stayed put with some family close by and others only a plane ticket, or a day's drive away.

CAB CHASSIS UTES -DISAPPOINTING **SAFETY RATINGS**

Australia's leading independent The centre front seating position vehicle safety advocate, the **Australasian New Car Assessment** Program, today announced a disappointing 3-star safety ratings for two cab chassis utes - the Toyota Landcruiser 70 Series and the Nissan Patrol – following crash tests of the vehicles.

DTEI's Director Road Safety, Martin Small said the 3-star rating for the two utes, which are popular in rural areas, was not a good result.

"They both provided very disappointing protection for occupants and poor protection for pedestrians struck by the front of the vehicle," he said.

"Research shows that, for every star you take off, the risk of serious and life-threatening injury increases. Owners and drivers of commercial vehicles need to consider safety in the event of a crash. ANCAP has concerns about the safety ratings for these two utes. The vehicles offered minimal safety features and the passenger compartment lost structural integrity in both crash

"Neither of these vehicles provided adequate occupant protection in their respective tests – there was particularly severe deformation of the floor and footwell areas," he said

in both vehicles have a lap-only seat belt and no air bag whereby the occupant is at a greatly increased risk of severe injury compared with those protected by a lap/sash seat belt and an air bag, said RAA Head of Technical and Automotive, Mark Borlace.

"While understanding these utes are built on a separate chassis and are more of a work-style ute than a passenger vehicle, the results do not bode well for the driver and any occupants in the event of a severe crash. These vehicles are often driven on rural roads, where crashes as severe as the ANCAP offset crash test are not unusual the occupants deserve better protection," he said.

ANCAP recommends at least 4 stars and preferably 5 stars for commercial vehicles. There are already several 4 and 5 star commercial vehicles on the market. For a full list of ANCAP's vehicle safety ratings, including more commercial and work vehicles, go to www.ancap.com.au.

The Nissan Patrol DX Cab/ Chass Utility received an overall score of 21.6 (out of 37)



7TH NATIONAL OPAL SYMPOSIUM PHOTOGRAPHIC COMPETITION


The National Opal Symposium organising committee is well underway with plans for the 7th National Opal Symposium. One of the more exciting developments is the launch of an opal industry photographic



VIOLENT STORMS LASH OPAL MINING TOWN

Andamooka has reported suffering over \$500,000 worth of damage as a fierce storm left a trail of damage when it hit the opal mining town in South Australia on Monday night.

Andamooka Progress Association chairman Peter Allan reported at least a dozen houses losing their roofs. Other airborne debris has caused damage to power lines, affecting the town.

Residents in Andamooka have needed to find alternative accommodation as due to the wind ferocity were unable to cover their homes during the storm.

Tuesday was spent attempting to contact home owners who don't live in the area and notify them of property damage. In the meantime the Progress Association has done everything possible to assist in protecting these homes from further damage with more storms predicted in the early part of the week.

Transport SA has closed roads north of Roxy Downs. The heavily trafficked Borefield Road will await a clearance before it can take traffic.

Some areas are either close entirely or only open to 4wd until the water and damage is cleared.


81,000 lightning strikes and 50,000 homes without power

At the peak of the storms at around 5.30 pm, almost 50,000 customers were without electricity supplies.

More than 81,000 lightning strikes were recorded in the 24 hours to five pm this evening. Ongoing storm activity means some customers may be without power overnight.

Much of the State has been affected, with outages on Evre Peninsula. Yorke Peninsula, in the Midnorth and Barossa, metropolitan Adelaide (northern suburbs) in the Riverland, Mallee and South-East.

The largest outages were caused by lightning strikes impacting ElectraNet transmission supply on Eyre Peninsula, Yorke Peninsula and from the Mannum substation (where flooding also delayed restoration efforts).



In all cases of storms the State Emergency Service advises that people should:

- * Secure or put away loose items around your property.
- * Move cars under cover or away from trees.
- * Keep clear of fallen power lines.
- * Don't drive, ride or walk through flood water.
- * Keep clear of creeks and storm drains.
- * Stay indoors, away from windows, while storms are nearby.

The northern suburbs suffered the worst impact in the Adelaide metropolitan area, with wires brought down.

"Additional crews were allocated to the worsthit regions but ETSA Utilities also has been mindful of the forecast of continuing storm activity and the need to maintain resources to continue restoration work overnight and tomorrow," said ETSA Utilities spokesman Paul

"The extent of outages and their continuing nature means it will be physically impossible to restore power to all customers this evening," Mr Roberts

"We anticipate some customers on the Eyre Peninsula, Yorke Peninsula and in the mid-North will be without power overnight, and possibly a handful of customers in the Elizabeth/Salisbury area where we have a number of lines down.'


The passing of Molly the Whippet

Solar Rebate plan "flawed" says Senator

Almost sixteen million Renewable Energy Certificates, with a current market value of over half a billion dollars, had been handed out to over 100,000 households so far this year - via an indirect federal subsidy, says Senator Boswell.

For 2009 the number off certificates was 1.7 million.

The main drivers of skyrocketing demand are state based deals to pay householders premium prices for the excess power their units produce, combined with the generous indirect subsidy from the federal government that amounts to about \$6,200 per household.

Householders receive Renewable Energy Certificates up front for all the power their unit will produce over 15 years – multiplied by 5. Householders therefore receive about 155 certificates, which have a current market value of about \$35 each. From next year the certificates will have a government guaranteed value of \$40.

The multiplication formula is currently due to remain in place until June 2012, and then reduce annually through multiples of four, three and two before the "deeming" of certificates phases out altogether in mid 2015.

Senator Boswell said a bid by the government late last week to reduce the number of certificates given to people who pay less than \$1000 for their system, after using their certificate money to help pay for it, was tinkering at the edges.

"The cost of the federal and state subsidies ultimately flows through the system and will add to the living costs of the broader community," Senator Boswell said.

"If the government sticks with the deeming formula that it brought into play in the middle of last year, that cost will be many billions of dollars before we are done. It has to scrap it, and scrap it quickly.

The fact that it is now universally accepted that abatement of carbon emissions through roof-top solar power is immensely expensive - for minimal environmental benefit - means the premise for the scheme is, as it always has been, false.

Coober Pedy Police News

At about 5:25pm on 30/11/2010 police were tasked to attend 26 kilometres north of the township of Coober Pedy in regards to a Mining machinery fire. CFS extinguished the non-suspicious fire and there were no injuries sustained.

On arrival police spoke with the complainant who advised police of the description of three male suspects who broke into a unit on the property. Police searched the area and located the suspects for this offence and all three juvenile males from Coober Pedy were arrested for Criminal Trespass. They will all attend the COOBER PEDY Youth Court at a later date to answer the charges.

Police were performing mobile driver testing duties when they stopped a 19 year old male from Mimili Community in a vehicle who was doing burnouts across the road from the Opal Inn Hotel. Police conveyed the male to the COOBER PEDY Police Station for a Breath Analysis Test. The male was later arrested for Due Care, Driving Unlicensed and PCA. The male's vehicle was also seized under the Hoon Impounding laws for 28 days. The male will appear at the Indulkana Magistrates Court at a later date to answer the charges.

At about 6:00pm police attended a Gough Street address regarding a domestic disturbance. On arrival Police dealt with assault and property damage offences between a male female at the address. Police have arrested the male for assault and also arrested the female for assault and property damage offences. Both will appear in the COOBER PEDY Magistrates Court at a later date to answer the charges.

\$7.3 million community infrastructure for South **Australia**

"This program has already funded 555 projects in South Australia and almost 5,000 across the nation," said Mr

"Since the establishment of the Regional and Local Community Infrastructure Program in 2008, thousands of local jobs across Australia have been supported.

"The funding I have announced today will keep more people working locally, support local economies, and build infrastructure to strengthen the economic resilience and social fabric of local communities into the future."

Funding has been allocated to councils according to population, location and growth indicators, with councils submitting project proposals based on their notional allocation.

BHP SUPPLEMENTARY EIS RESPONSE IS IN - PUBLIC TO WAIT A FURTHER 8 WEEKS

BHP Billiton operators of the Olympic Dam gold, BHP Billiton has now spent more than a year putting copper and uranium mine in the mid north of the state has handed the South Australian government it's 15,000 page supplementary environmental impact statement.

The South Australian, Northern Territory and federal governments will now deliberate over the project with a decision expected in the second half of 2011.

Acting Premier Paul Holloway said, "The supplementary EIS is BHP Billiton's response to government and public comments that were made during the 14-week consultation period after the draft EIS was published in May 2009.

Mr Holloway says, "the major development assessment process for the proposed Olympic Dam is very complex, involving collaboration of the Australian, South Australian and Northern Territory Governments.

"The next step in the process will be an "adequacy test" which ensures that there is sufficient information in the draft document for all governments to formally assess

"The EIS was the largest document of its kind produced in South Australia, describing the project and the potential environmental, social, cultural and economic issues that might arise during its construction, operation and rehabilitation," Mr Holloway says.

"Almost 4200 public submissions were received by the end of the 14-week public consultation period in August last year including a whole-of-government submission by the South Australian Government".

"What is proposed at Olympic Dam is the world's largest mine and it is not surprising that there has been a huge amount of public interest in the EIS".

together a comprehensive response to all the issues raised during the lengthy consultation process.

"The Government's submission alone was a thorough examination of the EIS and the potential issues the project creates for not only Olympic Dam but also the surrounding region, the nearby town of Roxby Downs, the Upper Spencer Gulf and other areas of the State.

This will be the largest project with the most comprehensive and rigorous assessment ever undertaken in South Australia's history.

"In making a decision on this project, account will be taken of all expert advice and relevant information, as well as all public submissions. BHP Billiton will be required to demonstrate that it can meet all statutory environmental requirements," Mr Holloway says.

"The Australian Government must indicate to BHP Billiton whether there is sufficient information for it to assess the project as required under the national environment law.

"The South Australian Government will also carefully examine the supplementary EIS and provide its views about the adequacy of the document to the Commonwealth.

"The draft supplementary EIS won't immediately be available to the public.

Only once the supplementary EIS is confirmed to be sufficient to allow a thorough environmental assessment will BHP Billiton be required to publish the document so that the statutory assessment can begin.'

Mark Parnell of the SA Greens believes that eight weeks is an unreasonable wait for the public to see the EIS documents particularly for those citizens who took the time to lodge submissions and those who have genuine concerns that exist around the Olympic Dam project.

Mr Holloway says the assessment and decision-making process under the Development Act will be overseen by the Olympic Dam Taskforce and coordinated by the Department of Planning & Local Government.

"This assessment process will involve virtually all government agencies with key inputs from the Environment Protection Authority and Primary Industries and Resources S.A.," he says.

"While it is not a statutory requirement of the major development assessment process that public submissions be sought on the supplementary EIS, if there are any significant changes proposed to the project these may be re-advertised for community comment.

For the project to proceed, approvals will be required from the Commonwealth, South Australian and Northern Territory governments.

"Each of the three governments can either approve or reject the proposal or provide an approval with conditions attached. Some matters can also be reserved for a later decision," he says. "It is anticipated that all Governments will be in a position to make their decisions around mid

After that, the expansion project will depend on successfully completing all required feasibility studies and on board approval of the final investment case.

South Australia is AU best performer in the Advantage Job Index for November

The region recorded an increase in job advertisements of 8.68 per cent. This is the first time this year that South Australia has recorded the most growth amongst states.

The stand out sectors in South Australia include education (16.84 per cent), hospitality, tourism and travel (16.84 per cent) and surge in job in trades and services, up 14.58 per cent.

Additional national findings include:

- National Jobs up by 3.38 per cent in November
- However a week by week decline in the number of job advertised indicates softening job market
- **Biggest sector winners: transport** (11.10 per cent), engineering (9.10 per cent) and legal (7.7 per cent)
- **Biggest sector losers: financial** services and banking (-2.3 per cent) and sales, marketing and retail (0.58 per cent)


